Look, say, cover, write, check.

Look at your spelling, say the word, cover it up, have a go at writing it and then check. If you have made a mistake, work out where you have gone wrong and have another go.

Write over and over again

The more times you write your spellings out, the more times your brain will remember the pattern of the letters in the word.

Try using different colours.
